adventurous in Forest School!






























Robins Class

Squirrels Class

What a busy term our new Squirrels have had! We are loving our topic of seasides and have virtually visited the beautiful beaches of Cornwall and also weathered a fierce storm

(complete with squirty rain!) to help us build a bank of adjectives for our story, The Storm Whale.

In history, we travelled back in time to compare activities and experiences at the seaside over the past 150 years. We loved watching Punch and Judy and in design and technology, we designed and made our own seaside finger puppets.

We learned how to write instructions and turned our classroom into a beach to practise building the perfect sandcastles!

Our writing is developing beautifully and we are all expanding our vocabulary by using wonderful synonyms to create interest in

our work. As a reward, we created useful synonym swirls and also made our own edible versions – yum, yum!







Rabbits Class

What a busy term it has been for our Rabbits! We have been busy learning about the Stone Age, from the Ice Age to when Britain became an island, what animals existed in those days, observing tools, understanding how people survived and explored Stone Age cave paintings. We have loved the story of Stone Age Boy and retold our own version as a class.

In science, we have enjoyed studying rocks and using chocolate to model how they form.

In RE, we have explored the story of Noah and showed we could be very sensitive and insightful.





There have been so many changes and challenges for the children moving into Key stage 2. We are delighted of how well they have stepped up, showing us how resourceful, reflective



and resilient they can be. They should be very proud of what they have already achieved.



Owls Class

This term, Owls have been learning about The Romans and Sound. As part of our Roman topic we looked at Pompeii and volcanoes and really enjoyed making our own mini volcanic eruptions. We have also looked at The Roman Army and created a BIG BOOK of our Roman Army reports.



To add to the excitement of the term's activities, we have been lucky this term to start learning the Ukulele, which we are really enjoying.

We are also thrilled to have written letters to the children in The Gambia and we are looking forward to hearing back from them when Mrs Barker and Mrs Bennett return from The Gambia after half term. We have also had a great term finding out about sound. We have learnt about how sound is made and how we hear it. Mrs Follett did a science experiment with the children last week where



they made string telephones and tried to send messages to their partners. We used our science knowledge to work out how the string telephone works! Well done scientists!

In Year 5 we have enjoyed learning about Vikings, writing Norse sagas (very gory!) and creating dragon eyes out of clay.

The class poem for National Poetry day was The Road Not

Taken, by Robert Frost, which linked to our PSHE learning about the importance of our choices, both big and small, as they shape our journey through life.



Undoubtedly, the highlight of the term was the overnight trip to Bowles Rocks where, in two days, we packed in skiing, low-ropes, climbing, raft-building (and racing), a treasure hunt, team-building games and a campfire with lots of singing! In Badgers' class we have had a busy start to the year. The children settled into the new routines quickly and have been setting a stellar example for the younger year groups.

We have been exploring the history of Victorian Britain and discussing how social change has varied their lives to those of the children of the era. The children were fascinated when trying to climb through a corrugated cardboard "chimney". Especially as they realised that many Victorian sweeps would have worked in 10-inch chimneys from as young as 7 years old.

In science we are exploring the theory of evolution and inheritance, which matches nicely with our RE topic of Creation and science: conflicting or complementary?

The big excitement for this term, however, was our excursion to Hilltop in Norfolk. The children (and some willing adults) enjoyed a week of High Rope challenges, night time games and delicious food. What a fabulous week it was.

Tag Rugby

Last week, Charlie, Mattie, Dexter, Toby, Jacob, Ethan, Owen, Heidi, Poppy and Margot represented St Katharine's in the Sevenoaks Partnership Tag Rugby Tournament at Knole Paddock. We were placed in Group 1 with four other teams and quickly warmed up and prepared for the first match of the afternoon vs Edenbridge. The children immediately showed their pace and skill quickly accelerating to a 4-0 lead. Subs were made and a short period of readjustment allowed Edenbridge to score quickly: 4-1. However, St K's soon returned the favour and re-established their 4 point buffer. As the clock went into the red,

Edenbridge managed to score via their rapid winger to finish a great match 5-1 to St Katherines. A quality match played with the right spirit and no shortage of skill. St Katherines used this momentum in their next two matches, winning 4-3 against Shoreham and 3-2 against St Johns.

In the final group match we came up against local favourites, Amherst. St K's performed amazingly and held the game to 0-0 for the opening few plays. Finally, the break breakthrough came for Amherst with 2 quick tries for their speedy centre. They didn't let this get to them and quickly replied with some dancing feet from Mattie and Toby before the score to close the gap to one. Unfortunately, this inspired Amherst to score twice more before a final try from St K's brought the game to an end at 2-4 in Amherst's favour.

The result placed St Katherine's in 2nd place for Group 1 and into the Ball Trophy last round. Our opponents: Otford and Chevening. First up, Otford. The game started and quickly one player for Otford stood out. The speedy winger scored 3 times in quick succession to the awe of the spectators. Despite valiant defence from the St K's team, a fourth score soon followed. 0-4. However, some strong running and silky passing showed the talent in St K's squad. 1-4, was the comeback on? Strong defence forced the turnover and St Katherine's scored again. 2-4, the spectators were starting to believe. Another try, 3-4. The children played their hearts out but unfortunately couldn't do enough to rein Otford back in and they scored once more on the whistle to finish the match 3-5 to Otford.

With no time to reflect, the children stepped up and showed their positive spirit by taking on the challenge of Chevening. A fantastic match of back-and-forth rugby left the game 3-3 with one minute to go and the ball in St Katherine's hands. Brilliant running and positive passing got the team to within a few metres of the try line as the clock ticked into the red. A strong run and dive to the corner looked as though the game had been won... Unfortunately, the player had fallen into touch and the try didn't stand. The final score 3-3. Our hopes for the trophy were gone.

At the awards ceremony St Katherine's and Chevening drew again. Joint 5th in a tournament of over 20 teams. Our only two loses of the day went to the overall champions, Amherst, and the Ball Trophy Champions, Otford.

A huge well done to the whole team on a colossal effort and for playing in the right spirit.
